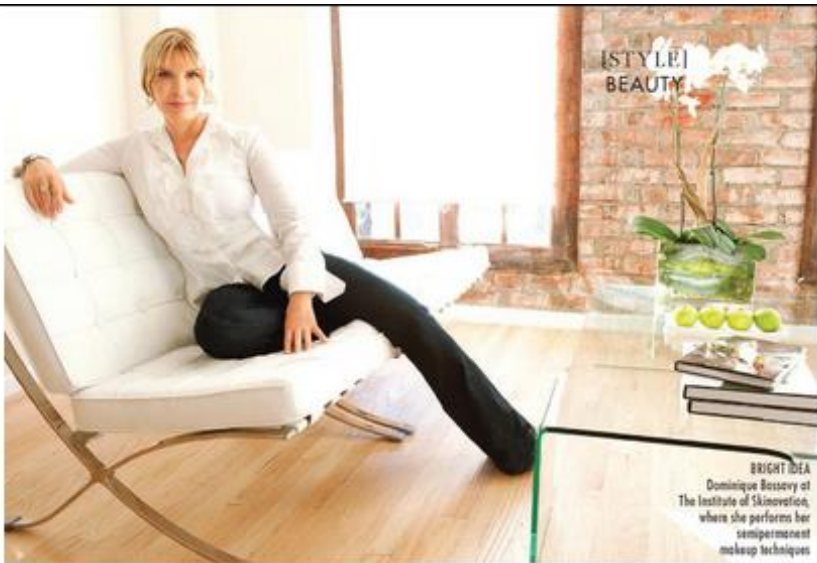

## TAKING SHAPE

There's a reason strong brows are currently on trend: They frame the face and keep it youthful. But not everyone has naturally lush arches; even many who do struggle to achieve the perfect shape. Growth serums can give a straggly look, while pencils and gels take time and precision, and often wind up asymmetrical.

That's where **Dominique Bossavy** comes in. The consummate brow artist can achieve the ideal arch, length and thickness with semipermanent makeup in about an hour (price upon request). "The shape has to hug the bone structure and be in perfect proportion to all the features," explains the French native, who divides her time between Paris, Beverly Hills and NYC, where she practices her craft at **Dangene! The Institute of Skinnovation at the Core Club** (66 E. 55th St., dangene.com). "When an eyebrow has the right design, it instantly makes the person look more beautiful and takes years off." Bossavy customizes color for each client and uses a tattooing process with tiny strokes to draw natural looking hairs.

In addition to brows, Bossavy can enhance eyes with a super-thin line on the lid, or create a fuller pout and minimize fine lines around the mouth by redefining the lip contour and adding a subtle boost of color. "I can instantly brighten anyone's face," she promises. —*Beth Landman*

## Needle Works

During December's social whirl, we want our skin to match the holidays' luminosity, and the latest way to achieve that glow is with microneedling. **Yasmine Djerradine**, owner of the **Yasmine Djerradine Institute de Beauté** (30 E. 60th St., yasmindjerradine.com), has recently introduced the **Mesopuncture Facial** (\$425), which uses hair-fine needles that make tiny perforations all over the skin, stimulating youth-enhancing collagen and elastin and releasing growth hormones. Simultaneously, these needles infuse the face with a powerful combo of peptides, vitamins and amino acids. The result: instant illumination that will have you party-ready the same day and should last through the festive season. If you have a little downtime, plastic surgeon

The face is numbed prior to the procedure, so the most you feel is a sensation equivalent to a small rubber-band snap. After a few days of redness and a little swelling, the results are fewer wrinkles, smaller pores and more radiance. —*Bl*

## Seeing is Believing

Technology addicts take note: Our 21st century dependence on all things LED is likely causing long-term damage to our eyes. "When we're looking at a computer, iPad or TV, there's a band of short wavelength blue light that comes through that can cause stress and strain," says **Dr. Susan Resnick** of **Drs. Farkas, Kassalow, Resnick & Associates**, a NYC-based optometric office founded in 1958. "But it's also possibly contributing to macular degeneration, an incurable eye disease, over a lifetime of exposure." The solution, says Resnick, is a new eyeglass lens that filters the wavelengths to guard the eyes, which is available at their Midtown East clinic. "Lenses look and feel the same, but they have built-in technology to protect ocular health."

Blur-light elimination is not yet available in contact lenses, but according to Resnick, wearers can shield their eyesight by getting fitted for contacts that absorb ultraviolet light. "We're trying to promote awareness of preventive care," says Resnick. And, thankfully, helping busy New Yorkers keep their peepers in top shape. 30 E. 60th St., eyesize.com —*Sahar Khan*
